"In January of 2009 Dave Keller had a piston failure in a Mooney 20C whilst he was departing runway 18 at Anderson Municipal Darlington (KAID) airport. He successfully turned back and successfully landed on runway 36, i.e., in the opposite direction on the departure runway. Fortuitously he had recently installed a video camera in the aircraft. At the time of the incident the METAR for a nearby airport (Delaware County Airport-Johnson Field, Muncie, IN) which is 13 nm northeast of Anderson was

VMC & IMC Club, March 20, 2024

On March 20th at 6:30 PM we gathered via Zoom for our monthly VMC & IMC Club meeting. With a shared passion for flying and a commitment to safety, pilots of all skill levels convened to learn and discuss topics focusing on pilot proficiency and safety in the air.

Our March agenda was packed with engaging activities:

- Cockpit confession: Sometimes you have THAT FLIGHT where afterwards I just want to talk out the string of mistakes and have my sins forgiven. A collective "Oof" and move on type thing.
- Open Discussion: Share experiences and insights in both VMC & IMC conditions.

VMC Question of the Month

Q: When performing turns about a point, at which point in the maneuver is the bank at maximum value?

A: While some pilots might intuit that the maximum bank would be when the crosswind component is greatest, this is not the case. To maintain the required circular geometry, the maximum bank (and maximum turn rate) is required when the groundspeed is highest, i.e., when the aircraft is at the downwind point of the maneuver.

Note: This is important to understand when flying the traffic pattern from base to final with a tailwind on base. If a pilot overshoots the turn to final, the tendency is to use extra rudder in an attempt to correct the overshoot. This results in an uncoordinated turn, and a possible stall/spin scenario at low altitude.

IMC Question of the Month

Q: What is the temperature-dewpoint spread reported via the below METAR:

METAR KGON 211251Z 34024G32KT 6SM RA BR OVC009 15/14 A2977 RMK AO2 CIG 006V011 PRESFR T01500144

A: While at first glance it appears, there is a 1.0 degree C spread, the actual temperature-dewpoint spread is 0.6 degrees C, as indicated by the Remarks section "T01500144."
